Advent is a time of joyful expectation. Let us remember and respond to this expectation in prayer, quiet time and preparation for the celebration of Christmas.

REFLECTION ON TODAY'S READINGS

The Time for Reckoning is Coming!!! - Through the parable of the **'Talents'**, Jesus teaches his followers a great lesson. The disciples are reminded that one day they too will have to give an account of the life they received from God. God's grace and gifts can neither be wasted nor can they remain static, not be hidden. They have to be put to use for the purpose they have been given and should bear fruits. What is evaluated at the coming of the Master is not **'how much'** a worker has made but **'how hard'** he/she has worked and how committed he/she was to the gifts given to him/her. In the parable, the first and second servants doubled the amount they received. No doubt, these two servants had to exercise considerable shrewdness and astuteness in investing

the money. The third servant, showing no imagination or industry, took an easy path, and hid the resources given to him. He was found lazy and unproductive and was fired from his job. For us, this parable communicates the message that each one of us is given a share in the mission of Christ. Our failure to live up to the call and produce fruits for the kingdom will invite punishment from God. Though the master does not specify how much we should produce, he does not compromise on anything less than the best from us.

Don't Be Lazy


This Week's Readings at Mass ► Proverbs 31:10-13, 19-20, 30-31 - A Worthy Wife ► 1 Thessalonians 5:1-6 - Stay alert ► Matthew 25:14-30 - The parable of the talents

We are in the middle of a series of Gospel parables that Jesus tells about staying alert and being prepared for his second coming. We believe that appearance will mark the end of this world as we know it. Jesus cautions his listeners several times to remain at-theready, even if their "master" is gone for an extended period like the man in this parable or the groom in last week's parable.

When this Gospel was written, about 50 years after Jesus' death, some of the early Christians had grown complacent and even lazy because Jesus hadn't yet returned. Paul alludes to this in his letter to the Thessalonians. There is a certain percentage of people who live mindlessly, enjoying a false sense of peace and security, unaware that things can change instantly—perhaps like some of us before COVID-19 hit. In a later letter to the same community, Paul calls out those "living in idleness, mere busybodies, not doing any work" (2 Thess. 3:11). Some people figured they didn't need to bother working because Jesus was returning soon. So Paul instilled a new rule: "Anyone unwilling to work should not eat" (2 Thess. 3:10).

The parable of the talents shares the same motif: while awaiting Jesus' second coming, we should work responsibly and for positive action, not be paralyzed by fear or laziness—the equivalent of the servant who hid the money. Ultimately, God will bring about

the fullness of the Kingdom of God, but we shouldn't wait passively for God to act. We are all called to participate in the building of the Kingdom. As disciples we are called to action in this world, during a global pandemic or not, not simply accepting suffering while awaiting



a reward in heaven. Jesus calls us to put our talents (gifts, skills, money, and otherwise) to work, alleviating pain, building healthy communities, and fighting injustice—while we stay hopeful and alert for his coming.
