# No Shame in Doubting


This Week's Readings at Mass

- ► Acts 1:1-11 The Ascension of Jesus
- ► Ephesians 1:17-23 A Spirit of wisdom
- ► Matthew 28:16-20 Commissioning of the disciples

As we near the end of the Easter Season, we read about Jesus' ascension into heaven in both the first and second readings. The Matthew's Gospel account is from the last few verses of that book, while the other comes from the first verses of the Acts of the Apostles. Some of the details differ. For example, in Matthew's Gospel Jesus meets the disciples in Galilee where the Ascension takes place, while in Luke-Acts he is in Jerusalem.

Like multiple eulogists at a funeral, the Gospel writers recount events and conversations from Jesus' life with different details and wording at times. What eulogists choose to say speaks to their memories of the person. They aim to convey some truth about the person they knew and loved and some point they want to leave with the listeners, even if the exact details they remember aren't all factually accurate. Likewise, with the evangelists. Whether Jesus ascended from Galilee or Jerusalem is less important than the experience the disciples had of Jesus leaving them in glory, not in death.

Even after experiencing Jesus after his resurrection, the apostles remain fully human, still capable of believing in him and having their doubts at the same time. Fortunately, Jesus isn't into shaming; he doesn't scold them for doubting. He also doesn't wait until they pull themselves together perfectly to give them their next task, to "make disciples of all nations" and teach others what he has taught them. This is all good news for us 2,000 years later. It tells us that Jesus doesn't find fault with our questions or disbelief and that he can still work with imperfect vessels. If we were to skip ahead and read about what happens to the apostles next, we

worked powerful miracles, taught with great persuasion, and attracted thousands to the new Christian way of life, all despite having some doubts.

The final verse of this Gospel offers a promise that can still console today: "Behold, I am with you always, until the end of the age." Although we may not be able to physically see Jesus, he wanted future believers to know that his presence continues.

What matters now is that the Church continues the work that he inaugurated. We are called to preach that same forgiveness, love, and repentance that Jesus brought from God. Since God, in Jesus, saves, sends, and blesses, the Church must, in continuation of God's action do the same. In what ways do you manifest these missions in your life as a Christian? To preach and to love are tasks that must be accompanied by words and deeds (actions).
