REFLECTION TODAY'S READINGS - Our Hearts as the Temple of God Many cultures make a distinction between the sacred and the secular. God Himself sanctioned that distinction when He gave the Ten Commandments. Among other things, His name was to be held holy. The people who were buying and selling in the temple did not respect the distinction between the sacred and the secular. Jesus reminded them by driving them out of the temple with a whip of cords. That was how much the distinction meant to him. The word of God teaches that the temple of God is not just the physical building, but the individual believer as well. Jesus actually uses the word Temple to refer to himself in today's Gospel. Jesus is the original and primordial Temple of God. Every baptized person is a temple of God (the Holy Spirit) in so far as he/she participates in the dignity and status of Jesus as Temple. The Apostle Paul urged the believers of his time and all times to be alive to their status as God's temple (1 Cor 3:16). The New Testament sees each Christian and the Christian community as a whole as the temple of God, the new house of God where God dwells (1 Cor 3:16; 2 Cor 6:16). So, we are encouraged to grow into a Holy Temple of God manifesting him to the world.

Reasoning Won't Work

This Week's Readings at Mass

- ▶ John 2:13-25 Cleansing of the temple


Imagine a man entering your church in a rage and waving a weapon to chase all the ushers, altar servers, Eucharistic ministers, and priests out of the building. Picture that person flipping over the tables displaying fliers about the upcoming Crab Feed and Bingo nights. Finally, imagine him violently throwing the collection baskets and their contents across the floor while he shouts that his father's house is being dishonored.

It would be a shocking and probably terrifying scene—which is how Jesus' cleansing of the Temple would have been experienced. Temples, synagogues, churches, and mosques are supposed to be places of peace, prayer, and good behavior, aren't they?

The thing is, Jesus didn't come to teach good behavior. He taught people to do what is right and to stand up for justice. He taught us to speak the truth, even when it gets us in trouble with our teachers, employers, parents, or religious leaders.

That is exactly what he does in the gospel reading today.

Jesus is furious to find money changers in the Temple. Worshipers had to pay a Temple tax using local Jewish currency, not the more typical Roman or Greek coins, and money changers regularly cheated the poor in the exchange. Jesus is angry that what was supposed to be a sacred site had become a commercial marketplace where sheep, oxen, and doves are



bought and sold for sacrifice. It was a "pay for services" model which led to even greater abuse of the poor who couldn't always afford to offer the sacrifices required of them in order to be declared "clean."

So when Jesus enters the Temple and sees how it has become a commercial venture as much as a place of prayer, he reacts instantly with actions that cannot

be ignored. If he had tried to reason with the leaders, he could have been disregarded, so instead he makes his point in a way that can't be forgotten.
